Voters get to select judge for 15th subcircuit position

In the June 28 primary, voters in parts of Homewood and Flossmoor will be nominating a candidate for a judgeship in the 15th Judicial Subcir-

Bernadette Barrett and Jim Gleffe are Democratic candidates running for election in the 15th subcircuit in the primary election. Currently, Cook County Circuit Court is served by 125 associate judges who are selected by circuit judges through mail-in ballot; 97 circuit judges elected countywide by the voters; and 164 judges elected by voters in the 15 subcircuits representing a specific geographic area.

The judicial subcircuit system of 15 subcircuits was created in 1991 to help diversify those serving on the bench. This past legislative session, the Judicial Circuits Districting Act of 2022 was passed and signed into law by Gov. J.B. Pritzker to help widen the pool by adding another five subcircuits. Voters will select judges in those new subcircuits in the 2024

Polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Election Day, June 28. Voters can also cast ballots at Prairie State College during early voting June 13 through June 27. Voters have until June 23 to request a mail-in ballot from the Cook County Clerk's Office at cookcountyclerkil.gov.
